A Tribute to Our Friend and Colleague, Denise

It is with heavy hearts that we say goodbye to our dear friend and colleague, Denise, a true Caymanian who left us far too soon. Denise was a dedicated individual who spent her life making a difference in the community, at her Church, and in her professional career, most notably with the Royal Bank of Canada (RBC). Her contributions are immeasurable, and her presence will be deeply missed by all who had the privilege of knowing her. Denise's journey with RBC spanned over 30 years, beginning in the late 1970s to early 1980s, during a time when Cayman was a much different place. She was part of the team that helped shape RBC into what it is today. In those early days, the Royal Bank of Canada was located on Cardinal Avenue in the Kirk Freeport building. The bank later moved to the corner across from the Post Office, into the old Bank of Montreal space, before settling at its current location on Shedden Road. Over the decades, Denise witnessed many changes, adapting to new roles, managers, and challenges, yet always remaining a constant source of support and inspiration to her colleagues. One of the proudest moments of Denise's career was being selected as a recipient of the Royal Performance Award, a prestigious program recognising exceptional employees worldwide. The reward was a Caribbean cruise, and upon her return, Denise was elated to share her experience with the team. It was a reminder of how rewarding it was to live and work in the Cayman Islands during those early years, surrounded by a tight-knit group of mostly Caymanian colleagues. Respect, camaraderie, and a shared understanding of life defined those days, where work and socialising were intertwined, creating lasting memories and meaningful friendships.

The early days of working at RBC were not without their challenges. Without computers and with limited equipment, work could sometimes be difficult, and the demands of clients tested even the most dedicated employees. Yet Denise faced every challenge with grace, maintaining a poised demeanour that reflected positively on the Bank. Her sense of humour, warmth, and constant smile were a testament to her character, and she brought joy to those around her.

Denise's love for her family was boundless. Her daughter was the centre of her world, and everything she did was for her. She cherished her siblings and often shared the humour and wit of her brother, David, who, like their mother, was the family comedian. Denise's infectious laugh and her ability to tell a good joke were just a few of the qualities that made her so beloved by

all who knew her.

Sadly, Denise has left us far too soon, but her legacy will live on in the hearts of those who had the privilege to work with her, share her stories, and be a part of her life.
